He will be visiting various locations throughout Jamestown and the surrounding community to draw attention to the seventh annual Jamestown Pig Pickin' on Aug. 6 from 7-11 p.m. This year's event will once again be held at Magnolia Farm on East Main Street, the home of Jenny and George Ragsdale. Parking is available at Jamestown United

Methodist Church. The theme this year is Patriots & Pigs in honor of members and veterans of the nation's armed services.

Elizabeth Swaim and Curtis J. Collins are serving as co-chairs for the 2016 Pig Pickin.' Honorary cochairs include Bruce Dillon and Dana Hughes, members of the Jamestown Veterans

committee.

### Town Council approves new budget unanimously

Having met in April to hash out what they would like to see in the 2016-17 budget for Jamestown and presented with the proposed budget in May, the Jamestown Town Council had very little discussion at its meeting June 21 prior to unanimously passing the \$8,896,214 budget.

The budget reflects a 3.31 percent increase over the previous fiscal year

"This was well put together," said Councilmember Lawrence Straughn, in his first year on the Council.

The budget:

- · includes a four percent water and sewer rate fee increase (\$2.85 in town, \$5.70 out-of-town):
- · maintains current refuse collec-
- contains funding for furnishings website giving information of the newly renovated clubhouse at Jamestown Park;
  - includes funds for design and construction for phase two of the Oakdale
  - Road sidewalk project; and • creates a new position of Laborer 1 in the Public Services Department; includes cost-of-living and merit raises for employees.

Projects like the East Main Street

and bridge, public water and sewer extension to the new Grandover Village area, and construction of the new Public Services Maintenance facility are included under the Capital Project

No one in the audience of the public hearing commented in favor or against the budget. The new budget will go into affect

July 1. Following adoption of the 2016/17 budget, the Council also unanimously

adopted the Capital Improvement Projects for 2016/17-2020/21. "For any organization to have a

long-range goal like the CIP is very important," Straughn stated.

The new Public Services Facility project has run into a few snags. Public Services Director Paul Blanchard said crews preparing the site have come across more rock and inappropriately-filled areas than expected, pushing back construction of the new facility. The Council approved extending the company's contract from June 30 to Dec. 3, at a cost of \$400

In other business, the Council unanimously approved:

- an amendment to a 1987 agreement between Jamestown and the Piedmont Triad Regional Water Au-
- thority; • a five-year agreement between

Jamestown and Guilford County for animal control; • an agreement of base funding of

- \$55,500 for the Jamestown Public Library between the town and the county, rather than separate agreements as in the past; • awarded a resurfacing contract for
- several streets in town to Waugh Asphalt in the amount of \$284,290, with \$250,000 of that coming from Powell Bill funds;
- awarded a sanitary sewer improvement contract to Breece Enter-
- awarded a contract to Summit Design and Engineering Services for the sidewalk projects; and • accepted a donation of a flagpole
- at the entrance to Jamestown Park from the Civitan and Rotary clubs. The Town Council ended the meeting by going into closed session to discuss a real estate transaction. The

scheduled discussion of a personnel matter was postponed. (Councilmember Georgia Nixon-

Roney was absent from this meeting.) The next Town Council meeting will be July 19 at 6:30 p.m.
